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TUCK WINS FOR REDMOND IN TRI-COUNTY TRACK MEET

Eight firsts and two seconds were all that Arthur Tuck, 17-year-old Redmond high school athlete, could take in the tri-county meet at Madras Saturday. His total score was 46 points, easily sufficient to win the meet, even if his team mates had not added eight more points. Madras high school took second place with 35 points, Bend third with 22 and Prineville brought up the rear with 14. In the grade school division Crook county was first, Jefferson second and Deschutes third. The winners in typing and shorthand contests were fairly well distributed among the various high schools.

FISHWAYS WORK TO START SOON

STATE OFFICIALS WILL INSPECT SITES.

Construction Planned to Open Entire Deschutes to Salmon—Screening of Ditches Ordered to Save Trout of Central Oregon.

(From Saturday's Daily.)

Preparatory to the installation of fish ladders for salmon in the Deschutes river, provided for by appropriation by the last legislature, Master Fish Warden R. E. Clanton and State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker will, in company with Deputy District Warden W. O. Hadley, make an inspection of the fishway sites about the end of the present month. Mr. Hadley announced here this morning. They will also take steps to have the ladder at the C. O. I. dam thoroughly overhauled. The building of fish ladders at Cline falls, Steelhead falls and Big falls has been advocated for several years past by Mr. Hadley, who saw the need of increasing the available spawning grounds for salmon, and at the same time filling the Deschutes river with the great food fish. The construction of ladders will in effect, remove the natural obstacles which have kept the salmon from coming into the upper river.

High Water Hinders.

High water has prevented a careful study of conditions at the falls, necessary before the exact location and specifications for the ladders can be decided on, but by the end of the month it is believed that the river will be low enough to permit an inspection by the state officials. Construction is to start shortly afterward. One ladder large enough to permit the passage of salmon has already been constructed by the Bend Water, Light & Power Co. at the power dam in Bend, and Mr. Hadley expressed himself as being well satisfied with the new fishway. Another way in which the resources of Central Oregon's streams may be protected is by the careful screening of irrigation ditches, and within a few days the state ditch superintendent will arrive in Bend to look after this phase of the work. Probably the greatest need is on the Squaw Creek ditch, Mr. Hadley says.

New Law Important.

Mr. Hadley emphasized particularly the need for sportsmen to familiarize themselves with the 1919 fish and game laws. The changes are few, the chief being the lowering of the limit on fish from 50 to 36 pounds daily, or if the trout are too small to make this weight, a limit of 50 fish is set. Discrimination against Central and Eastern Oregon is removed by establishing a closed season, regardless of the size of the fish, from November 30 to April 1. An old law, but one which Mr. Hadley believes many anglers are not acquainted with, forbids fishing within 200 feet below any fishway, and angling after sunset. A number of copies of a synopsis of the 1919 laws have been left at The Bulletin office, and may be secured here by sportsmen as long as the supply lasts.

Business Men Oppose Bonding To Pay Off City's Old Debts

(From Tuesday's Daily)

What some of Bend's prominent business men think of the proposed bond issue, which will be voted on by the people at a special election set for Tuesday, May 27, is shown by interviews which were given The Bulletin this morning. That a decision to borrow money to pay for past running expenses would be a disgrace to the city, and at the same time against sound business practice, stood out as the prevailing sentiment.

Floyd Dement, president of the Bend Hardware Co., in explaining his attitude toward the bond issue frankly admitted that he was against it and would do his utmost to aid in its defeat. "Bend claims to be some town," he said, "but if we can't pay our running expenses as we go along, we'd better sell out cheap and move some place else.

"We should be ashamed to tell the world in this fashion that we have to borrow money to pay running expenses. I think the bond issue will be beaten."

Commenting on the stand taken by the city council, Mr. Dement charged the Bend administration with finding out what the people want, and then attempting to give them something else. By calling a special election for the bonds only a few days before the state and county election, the council's sincerity in advocating a policy of economy had been thrown open to doubt, he said.

"I never did favor bonds for paying off debts," was the way J. P. Keyes, general manager of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., summed up the situation. "It is borrowing to pay for something that is already past and gone."
